

Reliance, Patience and Other -ence Words. Talking about the skills that the Scouts give us.

Scouts give young people (and our volunteers) Skills for Life. But how can we say that in an interesting way without it sounding boring? Here are our top tips.

Our general tone of voice

When writing on your website or social media we want to keep the language simple and easy to understand, as if you were talking to someone. Try and avoid jargon or business language.

Try and add a surprising twist to your story if possible to keep it interesting. If your local Cub pack has done a litter pick then you could say they were saving the planet one crisp packet at a time. Grounded Conversational Colourful Relatable Inspiring Surprising

When looking for an eye catching headline, maybe for a website news post or a recruitment poster, try to ground it to a place or time. For example: Thinking big starts in the village hall.

Writing about skills

When we write or list skills it is easy to list long technical words for skills. To keep it conversational, and more like what we see every week with our young people, why not try these instead.

- Adaptability With a plan B (and C) up your sleeve; thinking on your feet.
- Confidence Take a deep breath and speak up; speaking up.
- Courage Ignore the butterflies and go for it.
- Curiosity Asking the big questions; thinking aloud; wide-open mind; question.
- **Dedication** Sticking at it; going for it; seeing it through to the end.
- Empathy Stepping into their shoes; seeing their side.
- Independence Under your own steam; doing your own thing.
- Initiative Thinking for yourself; looking at it from a different angle.
- Leadership Standing up; being a guiding light.
- Motivation Go-getting; give it a go; do-er and a give it a go-er.
- Patience As long as it takes; no rush.
- Planning Thinking ahead; see the big picture; think about what's next and plan for it.
- **Resilience** Try, try again; Get back up and try again.
- **Responsibility** Making sure it gets done; prove yourself; give back.
- Self-esteem Feeling good about yourself; I did that; believing in yourself.
- **Teamwork** Mucking in; playing your part.

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Putting it all together.

When writing these, lists can be your friend. It adds a structure to what you're saying and make it flow easier. You can see an example of lists in action below from a section in Hampshire.
